When the long break stretches out in front of you, you might find yourself at a loose end. Here are some ideas that break away from piano-lesson work:





Exam Stats Academic Year 2024–2025





The Performance Grade exam has continued to be the most popular, with 14% more students taking it than last year.




Pass

There are slightly more merits and distinctions this year and a much larger number of distinctions. This could be due to the increase in Performance Grade exams (see below). Once again, everyone who took an exam achieved, at minimum, a pass.





The face-to-face exams have done very well this year, with two-thirds of students achieving a merit. The Performance Grade has seen a smaller proportion (37.5% compared to 60% last year) getting a merit or above than last year, but is still sweeping up all the distinctions.



One student took Grade 5 Theory and gained a distinction.

Term and Series Dates – Academic Year 2025–2026

Please take a moment to **add these dates to your calendars** now, so you have them on hand for the whole year.

Please note:

- Term dates and series dates are not the same, but the number of lessons given does equal the number of lessons charged over the academic year. Invoices are adjusted for students who start mid-year and bank holidays.
- Saturday students are billed for 11 lessons per series to allow an 'occasional day' for the teacher. A minimum of 2 weeks' notice will be given of the date of this cancelled lesson.
- Notice for stopping lessons is required 1 MONTH BEFORE THE LAST LESSON OF EACH SERIES. Charges will be applied for notice given later than this time (see below).

Notice for stopping required by: 1/3/26

Series3 – weeks 26–36: First Lesson: 13/4/26 Last Lesson: 9/7/26 Half Term *25/5/26
